#### **Foreword**

Spring is the season of re-growth. From the inert landscape of winter comes life in all its abundance. From the seemingly dead trees and ground, fresh buds, blossoms and shoots appear.

This life, coming forth from a barren land, is the annual miracle that we know from experience to expect. Every year it is the same: new life triumphs against the odds. A new beginning is heralded.

At times our lives can seem barren, almost dead. Many people suffer from SAD - Seasonal Affective Disorder - when the long nights and gloomy days get them down. The weather is dreary and the news is always depressing.

Yet, if we have a spring-like mentality, we can take a different perspective on life. The garden may appear dead in winter, but the bulbs are only just below the surface. Given the right conditions they will burst forth in joy and vibrant colours.

Some people go through life in perpetual winter mode: bad tempered, never satisfied, hypercritical and generally pessimistic. Others are spring people, with a much brighter outlook on life. It is not a matter of being realistic or not, we all know that life has its challenges. It is more a matter of how we approach them.

Just as we are influenced by other people, so do we influence others. A person with a miserable disposition can depress all those around them. Conversely, a cheerful person can brighten up a room and lift everyone's spirits. Negativity breeds negativity, positivity breeds positivity.

Maybe it comes down to our general outlook on life. If you believe that "life is a bitch and then you die," then you are going to give off an unhealthy aura.

I know what it is like to live surrounded by bullying, hatred and malice on every side. It was called boarding school. How did I cope? I became part of the system and my heart became blacker than black. I really was stuck in mid-winter with no apparent way out.

Spring, for me, came against all the odds. I was lent a Christian book and learned about God, someone I had no idea about before. Indeed I had been utterly cynical about religion and had no time for "that sort of thing" at all. Yet here was something so wonderful that I simply could not deny it.

#### The Society of St. Francis

The Society of St Francis is a worldwide organisation of brothers and sisters seeking to follow Christ after the example of St. Francis.

Within the TSSF are three Orders:

First Order Brothers and Sisters live in Community under vows and serve Christ in outward service in the community; Second Order Sisters live under vows and live a life of prayer in the enclosure of their Community;

Third Order Brothers and Sisters have vowed a lifelong commitment to Christ, whilst pursuing their normal life. Unlike the First and Second Orders, they do not live in the literal acceptance of poverty, chastity and obedience but they observe this spirit in their daily lives. Poverty is seen as freedom from self, chastity as the total gift of self and obedience as the joyful abandonment to God.

The Franciscan aims are threefold: to make our Lord known and loved everywhere, to spread the spirit of love and harmony and to live simply. The aims are expressed in three ways of service: prayer, study and work. We try to live out these aims and ways of service with the three notes of the Order: humility, love and joy. These notes are God-given graces, the gift of the Holy Spirit. I have been a professed member of the Franciscan Third Order since 1991, attracted by the charisma of St. Francis, a man known to be in love with God. He embraced Lady Poverty as his bride, so that no wealth or privilege could come between him and Christ. He saw God in all creation and addressed nature as "Brother and Sister", beautifully expressed in his Canticle of the Creatures. The combination of discipline, challenge, love and joy drew me to the Order. I needed a "Rule of Life" to help me shape my Christian life, a trellis to support me.

I value being part of a dispersed community of praying people, as we pray for and support each other in our Franciscan vocation.

I can only sum up by saying that, as expressed in our manual, I wish to live joyfully, a life of humble simplicity.
