Nativity of Saint John the

Baptist—24th June

Christians have long interpreted the life of John the Baptist as a preparation for the coming of Jesus Christ. And the circumstances of his birth, as recorded in the New Testament, are miraculous. John's

pivotal place in the gospel is seen in the emphasis Luke gives to the announcement of his birth and the event itself, both set in prominent parallel to the same event in the life of Jesus.

The sole biblical account of the birth of John the Baptist comes from the Gospel of Luke. John's parents, Zechariah or Zachary — a Jewish priest — and Elizabeth, were without children and both were beyond the age of child-bearing. During Zechariah's rotation to serve in the Temple in Jerusalem, he was chosen by lot to offer incense at the Golden Altar in the Holy Place. The Archangel Gabriel appeared to him and announced that he and his wife would give birth to a child, and that they should name him John, a name which was unfamiliar in Zechariah and Elizabeth's families. However Acts 4:6 refers to a "John" among the high priests who challenged the apostles' preaching after Pentecost, so the name was not unknown within the wider priestly family.

However, because Zechariah did not believe the message of Gabriel, he was rendered speechless until the time of John's birth. At that time, his relatives wanted to name the child after his father, and Zechariah wrote, "His name is John", whereupon he recovered his ability to speak (Luke 1:5–25; 1:57–66). Following Zechariah's obedience to the command of God, he was given the gift of prophecy, and foretold the future ministry of Jesus this prophecy forming the text of the Benedictus canticle.

St Marys Church Tower Update

- Comprehensive Specification document complete
- Adverts for tenders published
- Potential contractors visiting church
- Faculty to diocese for tower repairs completed and approved in principle
- Application for emergency funding from Historic England completed (40 questions)
- National Lottery Heritage Fund application on hold until October.
 Covid-19 diversion of funds
- Insurers contacted again
- Diocese concerned about dangers approaching unstable tower.
 Insurers and Structural Engineer contacted. Assured no immediate danger if people keep outside taped barrier and obey warning signs.
- Public Notices informing people what we intend to do, finances permitting, will be posted around the village and displayed on the website very soon.

We are now in a position to invite contractors to tender for the repairs to the tower based on the Specification document. Such is the seriousness of the instability of the tower that Historic England has stepped in to potentially offer some money to launch the repairs.

Time is of the essence.

With sufficient money we could start repairs in October

June Recipe

Creamy Strawberry Semifreddo

Ingredients

Whole or whipping cream 300 ml Greek yogurt 125 grams 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

STRAWBERRY SAUCE

Caster sugar 85 grams
Fresh strawberries, chopped 300 grams
1 teaspoon lemon juice

STRAWBERRY SAUCE TOPPING

Fresh strawberries chopped 200 grams 2 tablespoons icing sugar

1 teaspoon lemon juice

Method

Line an 8 x 4 inch loaf tin with cling film or use a silicone loaf tin

STRAWBERRY SAUCE

In a small pan add strawberries, sugar and lemon juice bring to a boil, squishing with a potato masher, cook 3-5 minutes stirring constantly, remove to a clean bowl and let cool and then refrigerate until cold (or place in the freezer for 10 minutes).

SEMIFREDDO

Meanwhile in a medium bowl whip the cream until stiff, fold in yogurt and vanilla then gently fold in cold strawberry sauce. Pour into loaf tin, cover with cling film and allow to freeze for at least 2 hours.

STRAWBERRY SAUCE TOPPING

In a blender add cut up strawberries, lemon juice and blend until smooth. Pour into a small pan add sugar and cook on low for approximately 5 minutes or until thickened. Let cool and serve if desired over semifreddo. Enjoy! Maybe with some Wimbledon repeats!!

Over the Centuries Chapter 6. The Saxons Part 1

The first Saxons to arrive on what was to become English soil were, it seems, raiders. However, the prospect of available land persuaded some to settle here. Possibly the early settlers occupied abandoned dwellings. Soon, during the 5th and 6th centuries, certainly by the 7th, settlements of their native dwellings 'Grubenhaus' appeared. Today they are commonly referred to as 'Grub Huts'.

I found early (Pagan) Saxon pot sherds on land north of Low Road at the foot of Hockering Hill. In the same field at a spot which during the 7th and 8th centuries, may have been the site of a spring, I discovered three sherds of Middle Saxon Ipswich Ware. It would have been produced during these centuries. There was no agricultural spread of either Early or Middle Saxon pottery.

Early Middle and Late Saxon pottery can be found in the vicinity of the church. Until quite recently the hills and halbours of an early settlement existed north of the present church . The land has since been levelled but I have Early Middle and Late Saxion and Roman pottery from this site. Finds included part of a 8th century silver brooch, now in the Castle Museum, Norwich. Middle and Late Saxon artefacts can be found as far west of this site as Slough Lane. At least one late Saxon dwelling appears to have stood on the field west of Mattishall Lane. What appeared to be the midden of this dwelling could be seen in the ploughed soil. I found nothing to suggest occupation extended north of Low Road.

Early churches were often built close to a primary manor house, in this instance Faldgate Manor House probably stood in the grounds of the last house to be occupied by a Rector.

However, I have seen nothing to suggest a church existed in North Tuddenham before 1086AD.



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
