Hello All

Hope you are all well.

Just a quick note to bring you up to date on the latest news from under the Parish Council umbrella!

Out last meeting held on 8th September was productive and positive; the Minutes are now available on-line for anyone wishing to read in more detail.

Firstly, as you are all doubtless aware, our Councillors and Mike Smith, are working hard with Norfolk County Council and Highways England to ensure planned updates to the A47 will impact as positively as possible on North Tuddenham. Amongst our aims and objectives are the wish to reduce speed limits through the village, particularly on the Main Road, and to lobby for a bus service to Hockering and through to Norwich. The former is a going to be a considerable battle because Traffic Management edicts call for a very specific set of parameters to justify speed reductions, not to mention the additional burden of economic constraints on Local Authorities who struggle to commit the finance from their already stretched budgets. In order that we can build as strong a case as possible, Councillors have asked that we request any residents who have experienced any 'near misses', or minor accidents on the 50-60mph road, to report these to me on clerk.northtuddenham@gmail.com. Any evidence we can elicit will be passed on to Highways and Bill Borrett, our NCC representative, who is in support of our request. We also aim to contact 'The Safer Neighbourhood Team' at Dereham Police who we are hoping might be able to facilitate some help.

We very much hope to welcome more members of the community to our next meeting on Tuesday 10th November 2020 at 7.30pm – please do email me for a zoom invitation link.

October Recipe

Blackberry Pound Cake

Ingredients

For the sponge:

250g unsalted butter, softened

425g golden caster sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla extract or paste

5 eggs

180ml whole milk

340g plain flour, plus 1 extra tab spoon for dusting

2 teasp baking powder

Pinch of salt

225g blackberries

For the topping:

350g thick Greek yoghurt 1 tab spoon runny honey 100g blackberries

Method

Heat the oven to gas mark 4, 180 degrees C

Place butter, sugar, vanilla in a mixer & beat for 3 mins. Turning speed to low, add eggs and flour alternately.

Then add milk, baking powder & salt.

Place blackberries in bag with extra table spoon flour & give a good shake. Fold gently into cake mix. Pour the mix into 9 inch greased and lined cake tin, then bake for 50-60 mins. until golden brown.

Turn onto wire rack & leave to cool completely (1-2 hours)

To make the topping, mix the yoghurt & honey in a bowl and spread over the top of the cake.

Then decorate with blackberries.

Over the Centuries After the Plague Was Over

It is difficult to conclude anything other than that North Tuddenham's population suffered badly from the Black Death. Much seems to end at about mid fourteenth century.

Apparent new settlements developed between 1350 and 1400 ad but seem to have been deserted before any distinctive C15 sherds were scattered on site; also, no early 14C pottery was taken to these later settlements. Did these people suspect that the plague germ could be present in pottery in use during the plague?!

A field on the north side of Dirty Lane and west of Elsing Road did yield a hint of C15 agricultural use. Cross to the east side of Elsing Road and it is back to pre-plague years. Possibly occupation continued on moated islands still; occupied today, often as farmhouses.

The Old Rectory is one dwelling standing on land previously enclosed by a moat. I have seen a plan drawn up showing building plots along both sides of the rectory drive. The artist's name is not given. It may have been a plan for a later development or one now extinct. Later, under good conditions, I saw that the Rectory Drive cut through an old building platform. Therefore, any buildings along the Rectory Drive would appear to predate the current drive and the moat crossing is not the original crossing.

A single sherd of transitional pottery from the area of overgrown land west of the Rectory House is slim evidence of occupation of the site during the late C15 or early C16.

Cuthbert Norris gave an acre and a half of land to the poor of the parish (1603AD) and recorded 152 communicants.

John Smith, Rector, gave a house for the Clerk of the parish (1670 - 1687) I believe the C17 house north of the church to be the said house.

NB The term clerk refers to a person who carries out an absent Rector's duties, i.e. a vicar.


