Grant Funding to save St. Mary's Church in North Tuddenham

Historic England has awarded an exceptional grant of £280,000 towards the repair of Grade 1 listed St. Mary's Church in North Tuddenham, Norfolk.

An urgent situation

The 14th century west tower at medieval St. Mary's Church is the earliest part of the building, housing a single bell dating to about 1380.

St. Mary's Church was added to Historic England's Heritage at Risk Register in 2017. The 14th century tower is showing major defects including structural cracks **which** have previously been repaired but this has not addressed a long-term problem.

The defects are considered to be progressive and may result in at least partial collapse of the tower if not addressed as a priority.

Exceptional circumstances

Funding from Historic England will enable emergency works to stabilise the tower including underpinning, extensive repairs to the north-west and south-west tower buttresses, repairs to the tower walls and parapets and installation of a new drainage system.

Historic England has considered the grant for St. Mary's Church in highly exceptional circumstances. The emergency works to the church are a priority of the highest degree, necessary to stabilise its condition and prevent loss of important historic fabric. Buildings in use as public places of worship are not normally eligible for Historic England Repair Grants for Heritage at Risk. In this exceptional case Historic England has stepped in to provide essential grant funding to prevent the church tower from risk of collapse.

"We have awarded this exceptional grant to save the historic tower of St. Mary's Church from potential collapse. The church is an important historic building, treasured by its local community, and it was imperative to act urgently to ensure that the church is saved and protected for the future" said Tony Calladine, Regional Director (East of England).

Distinctive Features

Within the church, distinctive features include a wide nave without aisles and a unique Victorian wall tiling. The chancel roof was raised in height in the late-19th century to accommodate a beautiful east window and at the same time a Bevington windpipe organ was installed. Separating the chancel and the nave are the substantial remains of a 15th century painted rood screen depicting several martyrs including Catherine, Sebastian and Ethelreda.

Throughout the church there are examples of remarkable decoration, including stencilled motifs, wall paintings, framed biblical texts and depictions of the heavens in some of the window arches.

Remarkable medieval stained-glass windows

The north porch has some exceptional medieval stained-glass windows depicting the saints Catherine and Cecilia on one side and a bishop, angels, dragons and eagles on the other.

Medieval glass panels in the tower window show sequences of the life and martyrdoms of St. Margaret, an important saint in medieval East Anglia, and also St. George, the Seven Sacraments, the Apostles with Creed scrolls and scenes depicting the teaching life of Christ.

North Tuddenham Parish Council

While the Parish Councillors enjoy a summer break, I just wanted to update residents about two meetings that have taken place with Highways England and Norfolk County Council Highways.

The first was at their request to discuss minor roads strategy around the new A47 with our parish councillors. The second was a multi-parish Local Liaison Group Meeting to debate the changes to the A47 and the NWL.

The good news for us is that the proposed new T-junction near Poppy Wood, connecting North Tuddenham, Lyng and Hockering, using part of the existing A47 to Hockering and the old Main Road into North Tuddenham, is <u>definitely</u> in the plans for the new dualled A47. Speed limits are to be agreed.

Secondly, HE have had second thoughts about closing Mattishall Lane in Hockering and are now planning for this lane to pass under the new dual carriageway. This will allow Hockering residents easy access to Mattishall and alleviate potential problems on Fox Lane for local residents .

We are going to pursue all the points raised with both agencies to secure the best deal for our residents



September Recipe

Honey, Turmeric Pork with Beetroot & Carrot Salad

Ingredients

1lb pork tenderloin- cut into 4

Salt & Pepper

2 garlic cloves ,chopped

½ tsp ground turmeric

1/2 cup plain yoghurt

¼ cup honey

4 tab sp fresh lemon juice

4 tab sp olive oil

2 medium beetroot

2 carrots-sliced thinly

1 tab sp chopped chives

1 tab sp chopped mint

2 tab sp chopped parsley

Method

Pound the tenderloin between cling film, season on both sides. Set aside. Whisk together the garlic, honey turmeric & 2 tab sp lemon juice. Pour over the pork and allow to sit for 30 mins.

Then in a separate bowl, whisk the oil, 2 tab sp lemon juice, salt & pepper and the chopped herbs and toss in the beetroot and carrot.

Place pork in hot skillet pan over high heat for 2 minutes, then add marinade to pan, continue to cook for 3 minutes on both sides until nicely browned.

Place the salad on a plate. Remove pork from pan & place on top of beetroot & carrot salad. Mmmm.

Over the Centuries

Chapter 8 Medieval Period

Four additional moated dwellings existed in North Tuddenham during the above period. A small moated island at Willow Farm, now levelled and covered with asphalt, appeared to date from the C13. An unfilled moat at Springfield Farm and the area around it yielded late Saxon greyware to mid C14 pottery. The Saxon pottery included sherds of grain storage jars and combined with a small nearby stream suggest a possible Saxon watermill.

Remains of a moat at the Old Rectory with pottery from C7 AD found on nearby ploughed land along with pottery to the early C14, point to settlement at least around the moated area, for a period of seven hundred years. Add possibly fifty years of Roman occupation and we find occupation around or on the site of the church for almost thousand years.

The fourth moat site, now levelled, was in Ballards Plantation; it was once part of the Manor of Mattishall-Tuddenham. Fortunately I was able to walk this site as it was levelled and I have more pottery from this site than any other .The pottery pointed to occupation of the site from a point in the C12 to one later than the mid C14. On the site of the principle dwelling I found a single brick, dated by Dr Andrew Rogerson to the C14. The foundations of two small houses remained. A porch had been built over the entrance to one house. The floor of the porch was laid with black flints of a quality equal to any flint from Grime's Graves. A seam of these flints can be found at a depth of about ten feet alongside the River Tud.

A midden alongside each dwelling contained food waste, small animal remains, fish bones and the shells of shellfish which could only come from salt water. The probable site of a revolving windmill, (a post mill), believed to have stood on a manmade mound, could be seen in the centre of the site. In the north west corner of the moated island a small pit was uncovered. The clay around the sides of the pit showed red from burning. The pit was roughly eighteen inches deep and four feet in diameter. Some large animal bones lay around the pit. Who said barbecues were a new invention!?

Population appears to have increased and spread to the north and west of the settlement in the church area. The expansion west of the church into Badley Moor caused a parish known as West Tuddenham to develop with its own church.

Stephen's Green, now Poppy Wood, may have developed in these years. It is probably a remnant of common land set aside to graze livestock of landless people. An animal pound adjoined this Green. The present farmhouse has a C15 date carved into its brickwork.
