### Parish Council Part 1

September has arrived and the Parish Council is hitting the ground running with a public consultation evening. The meeting will take place prior to the scheduled Parish Council meeting on 12<sup>th</sup> September and will begin at 6.30pm.

This section of the meeting will be to discuss the *Call for Sites* initiative, the Local Plan, and the consultation process; Cllr Bambridge will be on-hand to help clarify any issues arising around this, and will help to answer any questions. From our understanding, anyone can comment at any point on any of the three proposed sites in our Parish, and anything submitted will be collated and noted by Breckland Council. ### Recipe for September



### Devonshire Apple Cake

This apple cake looks a little unappetising when cold, but it is quite delicious served warm with cream or fromage frais.

### **Ingredients**

450g of cooking apples; juice of half a lemon; 350g of self-raising flour; 2 level teaspoons of baking powder; 350g of caster sugar; 4 large eggs; 1 tsp almond extract; 225g of butter melted; a generous scattering of flaked or chopped almonds and caster sugar for sprinkling. *PLUS*:  $30 \times 23$  cm  $(12 \times 9in.)$  tray bake or roasting tin

#### Method

Preheat the oven to 180 degrees C. Grease the tin, then line the base with non-stick baking parchment.

Peel, core and thinly slice the apples and squeeze the lemon juice over them.

Measure the flour, baking powder and sugar into a large bowl. Beat the eggs together with the almond extract and stir into the flour along with the melted butter. Whisk, then spread half this mixture into the tin.

Arrange the apples over the top of the cake mixture. Carefully top with the remainder of the mixture—don't worry if the apples show through a little. Sprinkle over the almonds.

Bake for about 1 1/4 hours or until the cake is golden, firm to the touch and slightly shrunk away from the sides of the tin.

Leave to cool for 15 minutes then turn out and peel off the parchment.

Sprinkle over the caster sugar and serve warm with cream or fromage frais.



## New Trial Bus Service for North Tuddenham

We have a new bus service to Dereham, the Konnect No.18 which operates on Tuesdays and Thursdays. It picks up passengers at The Lodge, and Mill Rd/Main Road.

The driver will stop if you hold out your hand to indicate that you wish to use the bus! Konnect advise arriving 5/10 minutes early to await the bus!

The cost is £2 or use your bus pass.

Use it or lose it. If we don't use this service, we will lose it. If used a lot it will help the Parish Council to persuade the Bus Company that there is a need for a more regular service.

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#### Women of Norfolk......MARGARET PASTON c.1422—1484

Her ordinary yet extraordinary life would be almost completely unknown to us but for the Paston Letters, a collection of documents that span more than 100 years in the lives of the Paston family, of Paston on the Norfolk coast. And Margaret wrote 104 of these, and through them we see events both catastrophic and mundane revealed.

Margaret Paston was born Margaret de Mauteby, the daughter of John de Mauteby a locally important family that had connections all across eastern Norfolk. When her relative Sir John Fastolf, a knight who had fought in the Hundred Years' War returned to England and Norfolk, the Pastons were a rising family: William Paston had prospered in the law by a judicious marriage and by the steady buying of manors, and had become a considerable landowner. The Mautebys, on their side, were people of good family and wealth, and a union between the two houses had much to commend it from a worldly point of view—such a point of view was 9/10 of the matter in 15-century matchmaking.

Margaret was chosen by William Paston as a suitable wife for his son John. Judge William Paston of the Bench of Common Pleas had waited until middle age to marry; by then he had acquired lands and the accompanying income. As a result his first son John was born into a family which was well-off and known in north-east Norfolk. John was at the end of his studies at Cambridge University, a young man when he married. He offered good prospects as a husband. And Margaret was an only child, her father dying when she was 11 or 12, and offered good prospects as an heiress.

A letter, April 1440 from Agnes Paston to her husband William in London, where he was occupied on the Bench, told him of the first appearance of Margaret at their house. The judge had arranged for such a meeting before he left Norfolk, and Agnes delightedly writes: "Blessed be God I send you good tidings of the coming and bringing home of the young gentlewoman that you know of from Reedham this same night.... And as for the first acquaintance between John and the said gentlewoman, she made him gentle cheer in gentle wise, and said he was verily your son. And so I hope there shall need no great treaty between them". The young couple were wed before December 1441 and although the bride and groom had not made the choice, the marriage was apparently a happy one, as this letter clearly reveals: "I pray you that you will wear the ring with the image of St. Margaret that I sent you for a remembrance till you come home. You have left me such a remembrance that makes me to think upon you both day and night when I would sleep." Margaret to John, Dec. 14, 1441. (She was pregnant with his child!)

John a lawyer, some time employed by Fastolf, and often in London, left Margaret managing things in Norfolk. The first conflict that she endured took place in 1448 when she took residence in the manor of Gresham, a property purchased by her father-in-law. Claim was laid to it by Lord Moleyn, and while John was away Moleyns forces violently ejected Margaret and her household. Expecting attack at any moment Margaret wrote to John, asking that he send immediate supplies to help defend their house. The now famous letter requests that he buy crossbows, ammunition for the crossbows, armour for their servants, pole-axes to defend themselves, and then adds as an afterthought a request that he also buy a pound of sugar and a pound of almonds – making it one of the most unusual shopping lists in British history!

In 1459 John and Margaret controversially inherited relative Sir John Fastolf's castle and estates. Caister Castle had been built to the best of continental designs and was one of the first to be of brick, with the clay from the banks of the river Bure being fired in kilns nearby. Caister Castle provided the family with the symbol of social standing and power that they had sought. Continued attacks to that at Gresham took place in the 1460s when the Duke of Norfolk besieged Caister Castle. Margaret's letters show her steely resolve, as she entreats her family for assistance: "I greet you well, letting you know that your brother and his fellowship stand in great jeopardy at Caister, and lack vitual . . . and the place is sore broken by the guns of the other party; so that, unless they have hasty help, they are like to lose both their lives and the place, to the greatest rebuke to you that ever came to any gentleman, for every man in this country marvels greatly that you suffer them to be so long in such great jeopardy without help or other remedy."

At home Margaret involved herself in the lives of her children: mediated between her eldest and her husband when the two fell out: opened negotiations for her second son (also named John) and several prospective brides, and when her daughter entered into an engagement without her knowledge, threatened to put her out of the house!

Margaret lost her husband in 1466, and after 25 years of successful marriage it is fair to assume her grief was deep. By the time she was sixty, Margaret was showing signs of illness, and in Feb. 1482, she made a will leaving money to the Church for the saying of masses for herself and her husband, and instructions for her burial. She was generous to her family and made bequests to the servants. Margaret made her final journey back to her childhood home at Mautby where she was laid to rest in a side aisle of the parish church Sadly that section of the church was demolished at the time of the reformation.
