Christmas is a great time for families to get together (if you have one) and generally people seem to be nicer to each other around this time. We enjoy the festivities. We may get a nice warm feeling about life for a while. We might even go to church!

But the basics of Christmas go much deeper than this. Christmas, in its essentials, is about God putting into action his plan to solve the fundamental problems of mankind. Sometimes we admit to ourselves that we aren't what we want to be, what we realise we ought to be, and we know we can't solve this problem ourselves. We realise that this life is not *ultimately* fulfilling. It was at that first Christmas, 2000 or so years ago, that God became one of us, as Jesus, in an event full of intrigue, involving foreign agents infiltrating a state run by a ruthless ruler, the murder of innocent children and people being forced to flee abroad. It was messy and hard for those caught up in it, including Jesus and his family

Why would we want to think of such things at Christmas, a time of such fun? It might be because we want to see past the trappings and the tinsel and find the deeper reality of life. Forget what you have read before or seen or heard in a nativity play, fun though they are. Have a read of the first 3 chapters of Luke's gospel and see what God was doing as he entered our world to live as one of us on the first step of a journey that would lead, 30 years or so later, to the heartbreak of Good Friday and the triumph of Easter Day. God is not "up there" just telling us what to do; he became one of us, with all the messiness that life entails, to sort you and me out so we can live a life now "in all its fullness" (John 10:10), to bring us into his family and for us eventually to spend eternity with him, beyond all the pains, aggro and hurt of this present life.

Seems to me that this is worth checking out in case, somehow, it is actually true. What do you think?

Away in a Manger

It was the beginning of December but there was little sign of Christmas in the village of Dangebora in Bangladesh.

We had been listening in silent shock and sadness to the voice of the elderly Dr Haque, as he indicated the empty medicine shelves in his dark little "surgery", and quietly told us of his uncertainties for when he dies....

We stumbled out into the harsh sunlight - and there, not fairy lights and Christmas trees, but vibrant, glowing colours and the sound of drums and pipes, as the villagers greeted their important visitors (us!) with songs and chanting, and their beautiful traditional costumes. They led us in procession to the centre of their community, sat us in the best seats and then entertained us with their dancing and singing and reciting..... Every group in the village had something to contribute. We were there for hours, as the sun set around us.

Then our Christian Aid minder, Mohammad, turned to us and said, "They would like you to sing now." A moment's discussion among us, and we started to sing Away in a Manger.

There in front of us now, their big wondering eyes following our every move, were the children of Dangebora, listening as we sang to the end..

"Bless all the dear children in thy tender care".

To this day, every Christmas, I remember those children from Bangladesh the poorest of the poor, living with such rampant injustice, but rich in warmth and love and enjoyment of life. Singing that carol always brings a lump to my throat. God bless all the dear children.....

Did Jesus really exist?

Well, the following people, all within 80 years of his life were certain enough that they wrote about him as a real person:

Mark (the author of that gospel).

Matthew (the author of that gospel and who took some of his info from Mark, but also added plenty of his own details as well).

Luke (the author of the gospel and who took some of his info from Mark, but also added plenty of his own details as well. He also wrote Acts of the Apostles).

John (the author of that gospel).

Paul (former enemy of the Christians, who wrote several letters to churches and individuals).

Peter (yes, the one who opened his mouth so often before engaging his brain, but went on to be a pillar of the Christian church).

James (half-brother of Jesus?). Leader of the church in Jerusalem, who was murdered in the early 60s.

Jude (half-brother of Jesus?).

Whoever wrote the Letter to the Hebrews.


Suetonius (probably – A Roman historian who mentions a person called Chrestus, the cause of trouble in Rome which led to the Jews there being expelled for a time. Chrestus was an alternative spelling of Christus, just like Chrestianoi (Christians) was an alternative spelling for Christianoi until at least the 4th century AD).

Tacitus – A Roman historian.

Pliny the Younger – A Roman politician who wrote to the Emperor asking what to do about Christians in his area and mentions who they thought Jesus was.

Josephus -Jewish a historian. His biggest piece of work seems to have had some bits added later (probably bv Christians later), but there is an underlying passage generally agreed to be original. Separately speaks about John the Baptist.

Clement – A 1st century Christian leader of the church in Rome.

What is Hope Explored?

Six hundred years before Jesus was born, a prophecy was made about



him, that he would be called "Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace". The gospel of Luke, which is an account of Jesus's life, explains how these prophecies came true, and that this is great news for all people.

All over the world millions of people find hope and help in knowing Jesus Christ. Hope Explored is a three-session series about the life, death and resurrection of Jesus that examines his extraordinary claims. Through teaching from Rico Tice and studies from Luke's Gospel, Hope Explored shows how Jesus offers us a hope worth having, a hope that won't disappoint us.

What is each session about?

Over three sessions, Hope Explored presents the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, and provides an opportunity to discover how he fulfils three great longings we all experience: the longing for hope, peace, and purpose.

The structure of each session is simple: a short Bible study, a talk and a discussion based on the talk.



DROP IN - We continue to meet weekly, Thursdays 10-12, and usually have between twenty and thirty people come along for a social morning having a chat over a cuppa. We meet in All Saints Church, Mattishall (ASM).

BOOK SWAP - We also have some books available to take away, just call in to the **DROP IN** at ASM to have a look.

CRAFTY - We offer the chance to bring your knitting, crochet, embroidery along to chat about with others and for people to have a go at knitting etc. and learn from each other.

CHRISTMAS PARTY - On Thursday 12th December we are holding our final meeting before Christmas and will have entertainment from Dereham based Bell Ringers and lunch. We meet that day from 10am as normal and the entertainment starts around 11am followed by lunch and ending with a singalong of Christmas songs and carols.

Each week we ask people, where possible, to make a small contribution of £2, although that is not essential but helps with costs. On the 12th December we ask that people increase that contribution to £5 as we provide lunch.

BOOK CLUB - Our **very informal** book club meets on the second Wednesday every month at 2.30pm in ASM. We do not all read the same book, we just bring along whatever we have been reading and give a brief description of the books and whether we recommend them, or not! Lots of



chat and laughing and the chance to find out about new authors and to swap the books among the group. We have a cuppa and cake as well so plenty to enjoy.

SINGING FOR WELLBEING - These free sessions are great fun and we have new people coming along all the time to join in. At one meeting we had 20

people attend!

We meet twice monthly, one evening and one lunchtime session, The lunchtime session is on the second Wednesday of the month, 1-2pm just before book club. The evening session is on the 4th Thursday

of the month from 7-8pm. Sessions are normally held in ASM - plenty of space and we arrive a bit early for a cuppa together before we start. Some meetings have been held in the church rooms (next to the surgery) when the heating has been out of action in the church but hopefully by the time this goes to print things will be back to the church.

You do not need to have a good voice or know anything about music, just to enjoy singing and having fun. *The aim is to leave with a smile on your face.*

COMMUNITY CHOIR - this has developed from the singing sessions, again, nothing formal, just a group of people who enjoy singing and we have led community singing at social events in the village.

Our next event for the choir to lead the singing is at the **COMMUNITY SUPPER** to be held on Friday December 20th at 7pm in the church. This will be a **FREE EVENT** for anyone in the village to come along and have a great Christmas social evening with supper, quiz, singing and entertainment. **EVERYONE IS WELCOME**.

LITTLE ANGELS

Our toddler group Little Angels meets every Wednesday morning in term time from 9.00 am until 11.30 am in All Saints Church, Mattishall. We offer a safe space where pre-school children can play with an array of toys giving the mums/dads/carers a chance to



chat over a cup of coffee or tea. Grandparents are also most welcome. Each week activities include creative play with play dough, sand area (or other messy play!) colouring or painting, a simple craft which is based on a well-known bible story, plus role play, soft play and much more.

There is a separate quieter baby area for those with little ones not yet walking but you are free to join in around any area of the church with the other children if you wish to mix with other adults. Mid-morning small tables are cleared, and snacks are prepared for the little ones. Some weeks cake is available for the adults! Once finished, play continues until we gather for story and songs, closing off the morning with bubbles and sometimes a parachute action song.

We would love you to join us with your little ones. We charge £1.50 per session with one child or £2.00 with 2 or more which covers expenses for snacks, heating and replacement of toys. All our helpers are volunteers as we love to serve our community. Currently we have mainly 2 to 4 year olds but not many babies. So, if you are new to the area and are currently at home with a new baby (or pre-school children of any age) do pop along and give us a visit, we would love to meet you.

It got me thinking!

I wonder how you felt the evening of the 29th October, when you discovered that there was little or no water in your taps - an event that, by the time you read this, you have forgotten about! How did that realisation make you feel? Annoyed? Frustrated? Vulnerable? I remember



waking up the next morning wondering if I was able to make a cup of tea! It got me thinking! If that's the only problem I've got to wake up to today, then well, "praise the Lord!"

Some years ago, my family lived in India where power cuts could happen 2 - 3 times a day and very often the water was cut off for hours and on occasions, for days at a time! We very quickly learnt how to adapt in that sort of environment. Those occasions made me very mindful of those living in the slums and out in the fields who toiled through daily life without those basic human essentials.

In our community, we very often take so much for granted. We turn on the tap and water pours out; when we flick a switch, our lights come on; we can make our beloved cuppa without a second thought; we cook our meals on a stove; we probably have a freezer stocked with food without worrying about it perishing and many of us can ramp up the heating when it's cold.

It got me thinking further! We have the freedom to walk down our streets in safety; we have free access to medical care, education and welfare; we can shop in a supermarket stacked with food from all corners of the globe; we can drive or take buses on safe, maintained roads into our local towns and our stunning countryside; we can sleep safely at night and so **so** much more...

We have **so** much to be grateful for. Maybe as you read this, remember to say a prayer for those who are trapped in war zones, those who are homeless or feel vulnerable in their own homes, those who daily struggle to make ends meet and for those who will be lonely this Christmas.

Rather than focus on the things we don't have, let us focus on what we do have and have an attitude of gratitude towards God for His provision...it's all His anyway!!

You may like to say this prayer:

Lord Jesus Christ, as we celebrate Your birth this Christmas, we thank you for all the good things You give us and for Your protection on our lives (take time to name the things you are grateful for). Help us never to take these things for granted. May we receive Your love, peace, patience and kindness so we can share those blessings from You with others, especially those who are lonely or vulnerable. Amen.

In the Bible it says: 'Don't worry about anything; instead, pray about everything; tell God your needs, and don't forget to thank Him for his answers. If you do this, you will experience God's peace, which is far more

wonderful than the human mind can understand. His peace will keep your thoughts and your hearts quiet and at rest as you trust in Christ Jesus.'

A Universal Heart.

"Author's Note on the 2005 Edition." by Kathryn Spink

"On 16 August 2005 news of the violent death of the gentle and much loved founder of Taizé, who had devoted his life to the quest for peace and reconciliation, shocked the world. When a voice at the other end of the telephone line relayed what had happened, a series of memories came rushing back to me: the time when



Brother Roger first opened his arms wide and greeted me with the exclamation: 'You have come and you are young!'; The shawl he once removed from his shoulders and placed upon mine; The prayers and notes he sent to my husband, thanking him for putting up with my absence from home; the time he spent holding my elderly mother's hand in the Church of Reconciliation; the way in which he would draw an idea out of the air and leave it somewhere suspended, then search my face with eyes somehow always focused on the invisible, to see whether I was following him; and the spiritual vision he had communicated to me over the years, as much by his presence as by any words.

At Taizé, messages of sympathy and solidarity poured in from far and near. More than ever, it was realized, the community's calling to forgiveness, peace, reconciliation and trust was being put to the test. Brother Roger himself put his trust in the mystery of the transfiguration, that process by which God penetrates those places within us that are hardened, incredulous or disquieting with the life of his Spirit and so transforms them. God, Brother Roger insisted, would traverse them to give them his face. In the days that followed his death, it became apparent to the brothers that dismay at what had happened was being transformed — transfigured even — through the prayers, solidarity and immense sense of communion with people throughout the world.



It is out of the same sense of communion that this book has been reissued, [see details below] in order that those seeking to know about Brother Roger and the community committed to continuing his ecumenical vocation might discover just a little more. It has not been possible to revise completely

the original edition, published in 1986, but only to add an epilogue encompassing the major developments of the interim years. The spirit of Taizé, however, has remained the same. It is a spirit of contemplative expectation, trust and hope based on the recognition that God loves us first before inviting us to love him. Such a spirit allows for unlimited possibilities even in moments of trial, perhaps particularly in moments of trial. 'In your darkness', proclaimed Brother Roger, 'a fire is lit which will never be extinguished. You who would be the bearer of a fire into the very hearts of humanity, will you allow the inner life to grow within you?' The continual growth of that life was, in the vision of Brother Roger, the supreme human adventure"

I am hoping this extract may have interested you in finding out more about Brother Roger. It is taken from the book 'A Universal Heart – the Life and Vision of Brother Roger of Taizé' (2nd Edition) a biography of Brother Roger's life. https://www.taize.fr/en



Our PTA has been busy redeveloping our pond and garden area with the support of local companies. With the help of volunteers they are clearing




